LETTER TO THE CIRCUIT

Rev Helen Kirk

I am an enthusiastic but very amateur gardener. In the centre of my front garden there is a bush – I cannot tell you what it is called. For most of the year it is a fairly ordinary shrub; often it looks like it is on its last legs and we have at times contemplated digging it up but then come the spring, buds of new life appear on its spindly twigs and by May it a mass of colour and its beautiful and spectacular flowers transform the whole garden. Sometimes the things that look like they have little life are just waiting for the right season to bloom.

During April, May & June I have been trying to visit each church in the circuit to hear of the 'good news'; the seeds of growth that are taking place in each congregation & community as well as to listen to the issues that each church faces.

As the superintendent minister it has been a real privilege to hear that so many good things are happening: work with children & young people, ecumenical relationships, engagement with communities and our buildings in use 7 days a week. There is much to be hopeful about across our circuit.

However every church I have visited has raised the same issue: our Sunday congregations are getting older; there are fewer people to take on the 'jobs' and there are many expressing fears for the future. What can we do in the face of a society for whom the majority of people no longer profess any faith? Is the church on its last legs? To be honest I do not have an answer.

Today, as I write, is 24th May, Wesley day; the anniversary of the moment when a struggling Anglican priest and failed missionary called John Wesley had his 'heart strangely warmed' by God such that he went on to transform our nation.

John Wesley had spent his life striving to do the right things but it was only when he was touched by God's grace and renewed by God's Spirit that he was enabled to form and lead a movement that called people afresh to a relationship with Christ; crossed barriers of class and gender and challenged the injustices of society. It was called Methodism.

This is our history and it reminds us that it is God's initiative, God's purpose, God's creative action that ultimately transforms our human endeavour into something that grows and flourishes and changes its environment.

I think God still has a purpose for his church and I think he still has a plan for the people called Methodist. As I have visited the churches in the circuit I have been deeply impressed by so many faithful and committed people and the buds of new life that are appearing. So let us together continue to seek God's purpose that his church may once again blossom.

*O breath of life, come sweeping through us,
Revive Thy church with life and power;
O Breath of life, come, cleanse, renew us,
And fit Thy church to meet this hour.*

*O wind of God, come bend us, break us,
Till humbly we confess our need;
Then in Thy tenderness remake us,

Thank you also to Gordon our coach driver for getting us around safely and being accommodating to our changing wishes. We must also give a big thank you to Helen who led us so inspirationally in our morning devotional time. The Hotel de la Mer was very comfortable and the great food was coming out of our ears – some were able to refrain from constant seconds others were not! The sea front at Babbacombe, where many walked before breakfast, was delightful although on top of a high cliff.

Our outing on Saturday was first to the House of Marbles, which had



previously been a pottery, where we were amazed at the range of marbles there and the fascination of watching a huge Marble Run on a wall over the staircase. It had a very busy glass studio and watching them making beautiful glass ornaments was inspirational. Afterwards we drove onto Dartmoor stopping briefly at a very old

Clapper Bridge where all wanted a photo! Lunch break was at Princetown, not in the prison but in sight of it! It was a lovely warm sunny day and driving over the moor and seeing the ponies and the awesome landscape was delightful. We ended the day at Buckfast Abbey which has been fully cleaned and looked marvellous in the sun. Inside was also beautiful and a stained glass window in the Parish Chapel, behind the high altar was spell-binding. In the Cathedral grounds was a tiny Methodist Chapel also beautifully kept and still holding



regular worship services – a bit like David & Goliath, except there was no threat from this particular Goliath.

On Sunday we had been invited to the Methodist Church in Newton Abbot where we were very warmly welcomed and took our part in the service by singing a round song, and Helen told them something of our Circuit. Afterwards they provided all with a wonderful buffet lunch which all tucked into with gusto. (Never mind the large dinner awaiting us in the evening!) Afterwards we had free time either in Torquay or Babbacombe. I took myself to the famous Babbacombe Model Village which was thoroughly enjoyable – I was last there when my children were little around 1970!

On Monday the weather wasn't so good and the planned outing was to The Donkey Sanctuary and Sidmouth. I ducked out of this and with Paul Ingram visited Brixham. We hoped to go by boat ferry from Torquay but they were not running due to high seas, so we used our bus passes instead! Brixham is still the largest trawl fishing port in the UK and they



claim all other trawl ports around the country emanated from them during the last two hundred years!!

HOLY DAYS IN DEVONSHIRE

Later, during our stay, the rain came down and fog descended, but even though we could not see the sea as we departed from the hotel, on the Tuesday, we knew it was still there, just as God has promised to be with us always. We finally joined in responsively with Psalm 136, giving thanks to God by affirming that “His love is eternal!”

Youth & Family Outreach at Whitchurch

At Whitchurch, we are very much trying to look forward, to the future of our chapel, and its outreach partnership within our community.

We have long enjoyed a wonderful familial fellowship, which we truly want to continue to share with others.

With this in mind, the Rev Anne Varker founded Stepping Stones, a family worship that endeavours to meet once a month, and is now continuing into its tenth year. Bible Stories, craft and song are shared, followed by a fabulous High Tea.

The group went from strength to strength, but unfortunately, due to inevitable changes in family life, numbers began to dwindle, and it became clear, that as a chapel, we needed to offer something else to actively encourage engagement within the community.

The Rev David Jenkins, Louise Watson and I, joined later by the Rev Keith Edwards, started by 'entertaining and engaging' the children at the local school, with an almost monthly assembly. These are, more often than not, somewhat rather raucous, but share with the children that to be a Christian can be many things, but most certainly not dull!



A traditional family service was then reintroduced once a month within Sunday morning worship.

I then expanded the idea of Stepping Stones and in doing so realised an opportunity, for which I was wholeheartedly encouraged by the chapel, to provide a Little Steps baby and toddler group.

The first week, we welcomed five families through our doors, and every week from then a steady flow of new families, and now, a year after its conception, we are pleased and rather overwhelmed, to have a roll call of thirty-six families, amounting to over fifty children (with siblings joining us in the holidays) and have welcomed three babies into our fellowship with another on its way!

There is always a bustle, we have a bright and cheerful playroom full of age appropriate toys, play equipment, games, puzzles and a weekly craft. We also join together for singing and happy 'noise' making, and the children share elevenices, whilst parents, grandparents and carers, sit and enjoy each other's company with fresh coffee, tea and a slice or two of homemade cake.



We've celebrated Christmas, Shrove Tuesday, Easter, the Queen's Birthday, many adults' and children's birthdays, births and most recently, Little Steps own First Birthday, and look forward to many other festivities to come.

We are providing a haven of fellowship within our community and for some this has become a vital part of their family's lives.

We have seen numbers rise too, in both our Stepping Stones and Family Services.

Although, there is always more to be done, I feel that we can do this with a rather merry hop, skip and jump.....along with a good old leap of faith.

The Religious face of the Nation: FOOD for thought?

In a recent article in The Times the following points were made about religious changes in the last 6 years. (2010 compared with 2016)

- ▶ For every closure of a C of E church more than 3 Pentecostal churches and almost two mosques have opened. (some 600 Pentecostal and 260+ Mosques opened)
- ▶ more 'conservative denominations and faiths imported from abroad' grew, as historically dominant institutions (such as C of E and Methodism) declined.
- ▶ 7,267 buildings remain registered for Methodist worship; (some 6.3% down from 2010; representing 491 closures)
- ▶ URC buildings registered for worship dropped 8.4%. (ie 141 closures)
- ▶ young worshippers are more attracted to non Christian and migrant led churches.
- ▶ growth in worshippers is mainly a result of those migrating into the UK.
- ▶ the Church of England has some 15,700 registered places of worship and is closing some 28 properties a year.
- ▶ Britain is seen as more ethnically diverse with many coming to Britain from countries where there are strong traditions of Christian worship.
- ▶ Pentecostal churches have made worship a spectacle and a performance, using high tech audio visual presentation with more music and big screens and practical, simple preaching.
- ▶ more people now identify with no religion.

Does this provide a basis for thought? What might it mean for us? For those attending the series of meetings and conversations at Thame about the Church and Worship, might this research and number crunching offer a discussion point? Even for those not attending the sessions the information provides a setting for understanding where we are and what is happening in the UK.

FAIRTRADE MATTERS

While many of the Circuit's churches will not have the physical presence of the range of Traidcraft items now available, hopefully this does not mean it is a case of OUT OF SIGHT out of mind! Indeed, I know that is not so given the calls and e mails I receive asking for goods. That said I'm always happy to receive more and look to get items to you within 7-14days, possibly sooner if I have them in stock.

Remember when you buy a Traidcraft product it helps go towards their mission to fight poverty through trade, practising and promoting approaches to trade that help poor people in developing countries transform their lives'.

In terms of numbers, in 2015 Traidcraft helped 678,000 farmers and artisans and worked on 37 projects in 22 countries.

However Fair trade is not just an issue for developing countries. With the drive to reduce prices to consumers, there are increasing numbers of cases in the U.K. where production is unsustainable or not cost effective even after efficiencies have been employed.

As you will be aware the range of products is ever growing and last year Fairtrade sales totalled £1.67billion.

In addition to the more widely known about food items you can now buy fairly traded furniture (www.myakka.co.uk), beauty products (e.g Square Deal), flowers (Co-op and elsewhere), clothing (e.g. People Tree) and fashion items as well as recycled glass products. Given the time of year please look out for the fairly traded gardening items. These include pots from recycled tyres, gloves and compost as well as garden decorations and furniture.

NEWS FROM STOKE MANDEVILLE

On May 22nd we celebrated our Church Anniversary when the Rev David Jenkins led our service and a good congregation gathered to meet him.



Our Anniversary always falls on what is known by some as **Aldersgate Sunday** which is the Sunday closest to Wesley Day – May 24th. This year it also coincided with **Holy Trinity Sunday**. This happy coincidence provided a great theme for an excellent Service.



David showed us three stones during his sermon. A beautiful stone from the Jurassic Coast to remind us that God created the Universe and everything in it; a second stone, from his garden that reminded us that God is still at work today through the power of the Holy Spirit. David had read John Wesley's account of his 'conversion' when that same Spirit made him feel 'his heart strangely warmed' on the evening of May 24th 1738.

Even though John Wesley was an Ordained Priest in the Anglican Church this was the turning point which led to the founding of the **Methodist Church**.

The third stone was no more than a small pebble from Iona. A place where two friends had felt very close to God and found the Holy Spirit affecting their relationship with God, their friends and how they lived their lives. They had used small stones to give to friends as a way of sharing and remembering that special time.

It is possible that many of the congregation will never look on a simple stone in quite the same way again but see there a simple reminder of God's ever present spirit.

The Service concluded with the singing of the Hymn "Praise to the Living God" (No.87 in StF)



After the Service everyone was invited to a buffet lunch, an idea that was suggested and brought to fruition by Emma Colver which allowed many to have a good chat with David and Paula.
