## From the Manse

### Dear Friends,

Whilst studying for my Mission Shaped Ministry course recently, my mentor asked me about whether I had thought of setting up a prayer group for the project I'm working on as she believed that nothing happens without prayer, and she's right. However, we often seem, as Christians, to have difficulty praying. Jesus said this in Matthew 6

And when you pray, do not keep on babbling like pagans, for they think they will be heard because of their many words. Do not be like them, for your Father knows what you need before you ask him.

And Paul said " *pray continually* " in 1 Thessalonians 5:17 But how do you do that? I came across a concept that has a modern take – Tweet Prayers. Tweets are 140 character Twitter® messages that have become such an integral part of modern communication.

The idea is to say very short prayers as and when they are needed rather than struggling to make bigger longer prayers. Nehemiah shows how he used short prayers to talk to God and how to use them, e.g

Tweet prayers can stand alone (Nehemiah 5:19) or they can be part of a longer prayer (Nehemiah 1:11). They are uttered in the context of reverence and awe for the holiness and majesty of God (Nehemiah 1:5) They are conversational and spoken in our natural language (Nehemiah 13:14) They are simple and not filled with a lot of formal or religious language (Nehemiah 6:9) and they are tied to the setting and situation of the one praying (Nehemiah 13:9)

So when you hear a siren you can pray for the services and for the people they serve. If you're meeting someone for lunch say a tweet prayer without closing your eyes. If you're talking with people concerned about the health of a friend, say: "Father, we know you heard our conversation of concern for our friend, please bring them healing. We ask this in Jesus' name."

So go ahead, Tweet some prayers today and see what a difference it makes.

### They need your underpants!

Yes, it's true! Whitechapel Mission is desperate for certain items, particularly men's underwear!

Our Church store of clothing and goods is due to be collected and taken to the Mission at the beginning of October. Although we will have our Harvest Festival contributions to add to this collection we understand that the Mission is also in urgent need of toothbrushes, toothpaste, soap and plastic carrier bags. Thev are also short of hand and bath towels. We have a box in the Church porch in which small toiletries may be placed.

Every single pound that the Whitechapel Mission receives is fully allocated to its designated project. Not a single penny is removed for other purposes. No donation will be used for:

- Administration
- Fundraising
- Telephone bills
- Gas & Electricity bills
- Maintenance
- TV adverts

You have never seen the Whitechapel Mission advertising on TV, and you never will. Your donations are only ever used for direct expense to assist those in need and will never be spent on million pound TV adverts. For example: If a donor gives £10 with the intention of it helping towards feeding the homeless, the Trustees will ensure that every penny is used to feed the homeless. Since the charity's inception in 1876, not a single penny has ever been deducted for fundraising or administration costs. Tax reclaimed from the UK government's Gift Aid scheme is spent on direct expenditure. This allows taxpayers to increase the value of their donation by 25% and know it is also being spent delivering services to the homeless. All the charity's administrative and fundraising costs are covered by:

- Investment income
- Income generated from the Whitechapel Mission building. Money raised from rental income

We are pleased to report that the sum of £190, gift aided, has been sent to the Mission as a result of our Church BBQ in September. Thank you to everyone who supported the event in any way. It was a treat to welcome Linda and Roger Reynolds back from Suffolk and catch up with their news. *- Barbara Oates.*
