From the Manse

Dear Friends,

My thoughts for this month are sparked by two events. The first is that I keep hearing on the radio and seeing on the TV adverts about the flu jab. The second comes from experience of a computer virus. None of us likes to be ill, so we take precautions, such as injections, to inoculate us against flu and other such nasty bugs. Sadly though these jabs need to be updated regularly in order to keep up the protection. There are no once-forever cold and flu jabs.

I have recently had to rebuild my computer after it stopped working, so I got to start with a completely new and completely clean system. Whilst I had anti-virus software, I had to turn it off temporarily to enable a programme to update. Whilst that was going on, in the space of four minutes I had acquired 5 computer viruses. It reminded me of Matthew 12:43-45 "When an evil spirit comes out of a man, it goes through arid places seeking rest and does not find it. Then it says, 'I will return to the house I left.' When it arrives, it finds the house unoccupied, swept clean and put in order. Then it goes and takes with it seven other spirits more wicked than itself, and they go in and live there. And the final condition of that man is worse than the first."

It can be like that with sin in our lives. It may be that we think we are fine, we do everything we're supposed to as Christians. Then for just a moment we let our guard down and as Genesis 4:7 warns "sin is crouching at your door; it desires to have you, but you must master it." There is no formula, no once-forever act that can free us from sin in our lives. Yes, we are forgiven in Christ, but we have a daily battle with our sinful nature and we need to be on guard. Reading the bible is a must, as is prayer, but these things must be done regularly, grounding our lives in the way that Jesus has set forth. So as we approach Advent at the end of this month I encourage you to join a bible study group near you, so we can be prepared to celebrate the new life we see in the infant Jesus.

Remembrance Sunday

13th November. A day for private and public recollection..

The origins of Remembrance Sunday celebrations lie deep within the First World War.

The end of the First World War came with Armistice Day, which is now honoured with our Remembrance Day celebrations. Arms were laid down at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of the year, an arbitrary moment chosen to end the four years of turmoil that had spread across Europe, but a moment that has become embedded in everyone's consciousness since then.

Remembrance Sunday ever since has commemorated and celebrated the contribution to the war effort and victory made by British and Commonwealth troops, not only in the First World War but in the many conflicts, small and large since. The two-minute silence reminds us of when the guns across Europe fell silent.

Whilst we all acknowledge the need to remember the huge

sacrifice made by so many for us and so wear a red poppy as a symbol, we should perhaps not forget the white poppy which is worn to raise awareness of the need to positively campaign for the peaceful resolve of conflict. Judith Gerrard has some white poppies from the Peace Pledge Union which have been sold since 1933 alongside the familiar red ones. They cost 50p each if you would like one.

Birthday greetings to Maurice


Saunders, a resident at Icknield Court for a few years, Maurice moved there from Naphill where he had links with the Methodist Church.

A month late I undertook a cycle ride for The Bucks Historic Churches Trust.

Deciding that it would be nice to cycle away from my usual haunts, the ride started at Bodicote, south of Banbury. Cycling along quiet lanes we passed through numerous villages all with at least one Parish Church eventually arriving at Shipton on Stour, a lovely little town noted for its great tearoom. Suitably refreshed I set off for Stratfordupon-Avon, about 10 miles away. It was great to have a look around and enjoy more food. Back on the bike we travelled past Charlecote Park (National Trust) and Wellesbourne airfield where we saw a Vulcan bomber which necessitated a stop to look at this wonderful aircraft in detail. Then on again past a very old Saxon/Norman Church which we could not visit as it was locked and through other delightful places until after 62 miles and an awful lot of hills we arrived back at the car. We noted in excess of 30 churches.

Through your generosity I have raised £181.00, half for the charity and half for Church funds. Thanks – *Mike Pullen*.

Harvest Festival/ Whitechapel

Profit from the Harvest lunch, sale of fresh produce and donations (many gift aided) in the special envelopes, all resulted in £200 being sent to 'All We Can' (the Methodist Relief & Development Fund). This was a good effort for their 'Make a Splash' appeal, raising funds to work with the world's poorest communities to build new water facilities and improve sanitation. These simple basics, which we take for granted, transform the health of children and help them to make the most of their education and lives.

As usual, most of our Harvest display goods were destined for Whitechapel Mission, and Tony Miller collected them in October, along with many bags of clothing and toiletries we had collected over the year. Thanks to everyone who helped by asking friends and donating enough to make the trip worthwhile for Tony, by moving stuff into the shed and then out again (especially Doretta and her famous *trolley!*) and by loading the van. We also sent £140 in cash from donations at harvest and a car boot sale in the summer.

Tony said he had now been at the Mission for 37 years (*now the*

longest serving director) and still gets up every morning full of enthusiasm to help those who come to the Mission. He told us about Rev. Thomas Jackson who was the previous longest serving minister at the Mission and sadly died in his 80s while seated in his chair serving breakfasts. Tony thinks that would be a lovely way to go himself, but pointed out that the people in the queue waiting for breakfast in the 1930s were not at all sympathetic as they had to wait even longer, and he feared that might still be the reaction! We were inspired by his enthusiasm and love for the people he serves, and felt that our contribution was very insignificant, but Tony said that the efforts by individual groups and churches combined together were what enabled the Mission to continue its work and he thanked us for our commitment.

More local to us, but also responding to the needs of homeless people, is the Wycombe Homeless Connection, set up by local churches (<u>www.wyhoc</u>. org.uk) and DENS which is having a sponsored Sleepout in St.Albans Abbey in December (www.DENS.org.uk). Jesus would be banned...

A professor at Oxford University claims free speech in the UK has eroded so much that Jesus Christ would be banned from preaching on university campuses if he were alive today.

Speaking at the Hay Festival, Professor Timothy Garton Ash called for a rethink on new counter-terrorism legislation. He said: "Some of you may know that in the new counter-terrorism legislation, the Home Office is trying to impose on universities a so-called prevent duty, which would call on us to prevent even non-violent extremists speaking on campus. Now non-violent extremists? That's Karl Marx, Rousseau, Charles Darwin, Hegel and, most clearly, Jesus Christ who was definitely a non-violent extremist. The Home Office wouldn't want him preaching on campus. This is a real threat, I think, to free speech and one we have to fight back against."

Introducing his new book *Free Speech: Ten Principles for a Connected World*, he said it was not just the state that was endangering free speech. He said individuals are too quick to say they're offended. He's calling on universities to 'hold the line' in order for free speech to survive.

We recently held two open days for professionals and members of the public and the professionals were impressed with the organisation, work and atmosphere, and a donation of £500 came from one of the other visitors for which we are very thankful. We are very fortunate in having such a committed manager and her caring staff.

There is still much to do to get the Centre up to scratch. There are plans to refurbish the clients' toilet facilities in the upper hall area early next year, although this is dependent on funding. Our main project in the lower hall area is to enable the provision of a wheelchair lift between the varying floor levels, and restructuring and reroofing the lower hall area.

Fundraising continues. A recent raffle raised approximately £550.

We have been fortunate to receive recent donations from St. Mary's Church and the Princes Risborough Rotary Club, as part of the proceeds from their Golf Day earlier this year. Other sizeable donations have been received from the Masons at Princes Risborough Lodge, the Masons at Carrington Lodge, Tring Lions, the mother of one of the clients, and one of the trustees. We are grateful..

The King Cullimore Trust generously funded the purchase of a car to help with clients' transport. The new minibus has been funded mainly with a large grant from Wycombe District Council and an extremely generous donation from a local resident.



The pain of forgiveness

I recently experienced a bad situation finding it difficult to forgive the person who upset me. Forgiveness is never easy for me so I studied the Bible to gain a deeper insight into forgiveness. It's easier said than done, but harbouring bitterness takes up so much energy. Here are five Bible verses about forgiveness to think about...

Matthew 6:14 (NIV) 'For if you forgive other people when they sin against you, your heavenly Father will also forgive you.' It doesn't get much simpler than this forgive so you can be forgiven. The power of free will is incredible as we are blessed with the ability to choose. Nearly everything in life requires choice and forgiveness is a choice. Choose to forgive somebody who has offended you and free yourself.

Ephesians 4:31 (NIV) 'Get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger, brawling and slander, along with every form of malice.' There is no point in holding onto bitterness and anger because somebody has offended you. It doesn't change the situation and it definitely won't benefit you. We need to accept the situation for what it is and let it go. The worst thing to do is let a bad experience turn you into a malicious person.

Colossians 3:13 (NIV) 'Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. 'Forgive as the Lord forgave you.' Although parts of this Scripture are similar to the first, it can be interpreted in different ways. Everybody is different and we have individual traits that irritate others but we can't hold a grudge forever, so deal with it and forgive.

Romans 12:20 (NIV) 'On the contrary: If your enemy is hungry, feed him. If he is thirsty, give him something to drink. In doing this, you will heap burning coals on his head.' With this Scripture, the phrase 'kill them with kindness' comes to mind (but it doesn't mean kill them). In essence, always choose to do good things for people even if they haven't done good things for you. Doing this is an act of strength.

Luke 6:37 (NIV) 'Do not judge, and you will not be judged. Do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven.' It's natural to judge others when they offend us, but if we took a step back and try to empathise, it'd be a little easier to not judge or condemn. Then we can find our inner peace as we choose to react in a calm manner. The bottom line is we all make mistakes – nobody is perfect. (Contributed by ACE)
