

Dear Friends,

It is the season of Advent leading up to Christmas. For us as Christians, Advent is an opportunity for reflection – who is this Jesus? What does he mean to me? Have I a real relationship with him?

I remember going on a trip with a very spiritually aware colleague from work around Christmas time. She was interested in my faith, but only from a distance. I finally managed to tease out of her a one-line summary of why she wasn't a Christian – "I can't believe that a single human was responsible for creating all of this."

Creation is one of those topics that can cause great debate especially among scientists. Natural selection and evolution are the flavour of the day, so much so that any religious expression of our humanity (especially Christian expression) is slammed by those who would see all expressions of faith stamped out or privatised, and especially so at Christmas time. I have been reading about "Intelligent Design", a theory that suggests that even where natural selection and evolution take place, they do so in the framework of intelligent design - they are not random but rather guided. And therefore we are here not because of a freak accident millions of years ago, but because of a creative intelligent designer – God.

As Christians we may feel we know this because we believe that the tiny baby whose birthday is celebrated all around the world on the 25th December is none other than Jesus, the redeemer and creator of the world and everything in it. We are his creations, made, as Genesis puts it, in "His image" and created for relationships with God and with each other. So who is Jesus for you? And who can he be for your neighbour, or friend or colleague?

You see, God created us to relate to one another, to pass on the revelation

of Jesus Christ born on Christmas Day, the saviour of the world, the world that he created, and through His blood, redeemed. But what good is that news if we don't communicate it when we have the eyes of the whole world upon us – It's Christmas!! Let's celebrate it together.

So perhaps this year, as our President of conference urged us, you can seek out that **one** person, and introduce them to the real

Christmas. Bring them to one of our many events or services and let them experience the true joy that only Jesus can bring. And may we all share a blessed Christmas indeed.

Christmas Card & Christian Aid

Our Church Christmas Card, made by Junior Church, will soon be available. We are invited to sign the card to exchange greetings to friends within our Church family and a donation in lieu of postage &c. is requested to raise funds for Christian Aid. Donations may be returned (clearly marked) via the collection plate or passed to a Steward. A smaller version of the signed card will be sent to friends who have moved away or are unable to attend Church.

To enable us to benefit from UK Aid (a scheme whereby the UK Government pledged to match every donation made to the Christmas Appeal between 6th November 2015 and 5th February 2016) envelopes will be provided alongside the Christmas Card in addition to those in the Messenger.

Malaria is a leading cause of death in Nigeria, with an estimated 250,000 children dying each year. It's particularly dangerous for pregnant women, with the disease contributing to an estimated 11% of maternal deaths. Money raised will go to support projects in Nigeria aimed at tackling this deadly disease. Envelopes can be returned via the offertory either having signed the Christmas card or simply return the envelope from the Messenger as in previous years. Many thanks for your continued support, it's much appreciated.

The monthly luncheons will be on Thursday 3rd December and Thursday 7th January at the Baptist Upper Hall from 12 until 1.15pm. Everyone is welcome. 
Three wise owls!

The service used modern music. Something with which some of us struggle, but it was so appropriate in this setting.

I hope we can repeat this on future occasions, it was different for us, but maybe if we are to develop and grow we need to take on board activities which may make us feel just a little uncomfortable. This was a very different type of act of worship and it is good that we have had the courage to go ahead and try something different. After all we are all different, with our various likes and dislikes, so the Church needs to try and meet all our needs for worship. If a different type of worship is

attractive to our younger members then we must all be prepared to embrace change from time to time.

A void these at Christmas!

Law makers are busy people...

1. In 1551 Edward V1 decreed that everyone should go to Church on Christmas Day or go to jail. Added to that you should walk to Church. So put away the horses and carriages or any other means of transport..

2. Of course you could take a chance and drive to Church in your car, or even get on your bike, but be careful where you park. Under an Act of 1780 when George 111 was on the throne the police could confiscate and sell any vehicle

parked close to a Church. The money being distributed among the poor and needy.

3. Charles 11 forbade anyone whatsoever to do or exercise any worldly labour on 25th December.

4. Under the 1975 Sex Discrimination Act if you advertise for a Father Christmas you must make it clear that women can apply.

5. The ancient custom of kissing under the mistletoe is threatened by the Human Rights Act.

6. If you have your Christmas meal in an hotel or restaurant you must not have more than 3 courses. This was decided by William 1V in the People's Charter of 1836 and it still stands.

7. According to the Unlawful Games Act passed by Henry V111 in 1541 you can't take part in any sports other than archery, leaping and vaulting on Christmas Day.

8. If you think you can go shooting, think again. An 1831 Act of William 1V states that the only use allowed for a gun on the 25th December is to defend yourself or your country. 9. The Prevention of Bribery & Corruption Act states that employees of a company must refuse Christmas gifts other than small items such as diaries and calendars.

10. So sit down and eat a mince pie as long as it wasn't made on Christmas Day. Henry V111 introduced a law in 1536 which said nobody shall be 'concerned with their preparation'.

11. As for Christmas puddings, in the same Act he described them as 'abominable and idolatrous things to be avoided at Christmas'.

W^{hitechapel} Mission

Barbara and John Drake attended a Service of Thanksgiving at Whitechapel on Sunday, 15th November last and have kindly left the service sheet and the 2015 Annual Review in our Church porch for us to read. You are challenged to find the time to read both. We are reminded that Whitechapel Mission is a Methodist Church with a worshipping congregation, holding quarterly services.

The trustees write 'On our website and in our Annual Review there are many statistics showing the numbers of people using the different services that are provided. Looking at past reviews there is one trend that is inescapable and it is that the number of people turning to the Whitechapel Mission just keeps on increasing. Last year we reported that the number of different people helped during the year had exceeded 5,000 for the first time. This year that figure had increased to 5,332. In the annual review for 2011 it was reported that for the first time the number of breakfasts served had exceeded 100,000 and it has been above that figure every year since. Last year was 108,184.

If only the Whitechapel Mission wasn't needed! But the clear message behind these figures shows that it is and that it will be for a long time to come. For no matter how hard Tony and the staff work and no matter how many successes they report, the number of people needing their services keeps rising and every morning at 6am there will be a queue of people outside waiting for the doors to open.

The danger of statistics is that they are figures, numbers, something to be reported. But these numbers are more than this, they each represent a living, breathing human being, behind every one of which is a story of how they find themselves at the Mission. They come for help. For almost 140 years, through wars, the depression, economic boom-times and a few 'busts' there have been people willing to answer the call to help those in need. Without the staff, trustees, volunteers and donors down the years there would be no Whitechapel Mission today to help those individuals who come to begin to find their place back in society.

Support takes many forms, donating food, clothing or money, volunteering, or maybe telling our story to family, friends, neighbours or work colleagues and encouraging them to become part of 'The Whitechapel family'. Whatever form your support takes 'Thank you'.
