From the Manse :

Dear Friends,

We are now several weeks into the new year and Easter is already on the horizon – or at least it seems to be in the supermarkets!! However, I think that the time between Christmas and Easter is a gift we should use to reflect on our journey through life. Music is often a wonderful way to help us reflect on that journey and I was looking on YouTube at some of the songs from the 80's and 90's and early 2000's One song I remembered is from a female singer called Dido and the song is called "*Life for Rent.*"

I can't remember if it made the No 1 slot but the chorus of the song is quite a spiritual kick in the rear. I checked her website to see if she is a Christian but it doesn't seem like it. The words?

If my life is for rent, and I don't learn to buy. Then I deserve nothing more than I get, and nothing that I have is truly mine.

February does see us moving toward a very early Easter, and in fact Ash Wednesday is the 10th of this month. Lent is also a fantastic opportunity to reflect on the significance of Jesus death and resurrection and the impact it has on our individual lives, particularly our spiritual lives.

Are our lives for rent? Well in a sense yes! Our time on this planet is fleeting. What we do with our lives is important, and if we "*don't learn to buy*" in the sense of living, I mean really living the life that Jesus would have us live then we "*deserve nothing more than we get*." In life as in all things, we get out what we put in. So it is with our spiritual journey with Christ. If we invest time with Jesus, even just 15 minutes a day, then we will reap the rewards.

I was reading The Screwtape Letters by C.S.Lewis the other day and the suggestion there was that the Devil's plan for Christians was to keep them busy with the everyday things of life in order to stop them from forming a real relationship with Christ. Busy with work, busy with possessions, busy with arguments and stress. Busy building up worldly things. This brings in the last line of the song "*and nothing that I have is truly mine*". When we die we take nothing from this world with us, and if all we have is worldly wealth then we have nothing.

So I urge you to spend time with God, quiet, reflective, valuable time with God. So that when the time comes you will have bought from the true source of life, will have everything you deserve and all you have will be truly yours, treasure in heaven. *Keith Edwards*

Shrove Tuesday - 9th February

Lent is the long build up to Easter and the day before Lent is Shrove Tuesday. 'Shrove' means being forgiven for wrong-doings. Another name for Shrove Tuesday is Pancake Day. Historically this was a day for feasting and having a good time. People went to church to confess the bad things they had done and would be 'shriven' or forgiven before the start of Lent. As rich foods such as eggs were forbidden during Lent, one way of using them up would be to make pancakes.

Its popular to make pancakes on Shrove Tuesday and in some parts of the UK run in pancake races. This custom grew due to a legend dating from 1445. The story goes that on Shrove Tuesday one woman was still making pancakes as the church bells rang. Rather than be late she took her frying pan and pancake with her! Five good things about

In case you're thinking at this time of year that Lent (as one writer described it) is all about prohibitions, here are five good things about it.

1. It only lasts 40 days. Fasts can't last forever, but Lent has a manageable 40 days. New Year Resolutions stretch off into some impossibly distant horizon, but our Lenten attempts at discipline sweets etc. have an end date.

2. We don't include Sunday. Sunday is never a day of fasting but a weekly celebration of the resurrection of Jesus. So – and this is official – Sundays don't count in Lent!

3. A bit of self-denial is better than a lot of self-indulgence. We live in a self-indulgent society. Just for 40 days it's no bad thing to deny ourselves a minor luxury or a bit of self-pampering – especially if it saves some money which could go to people in the world who have no luxuries.

4. It's a journey towards Easter. Lent goes somewhere, and that somewhere is the empty tomb of Easter morning. It's daffodils in the churchyard and new life all around us.

5. The days get longer. The English word for this season is the only one that has no religious significance at all. 'Lent' is simply an abbreviation of the Old English word 'lencten' which means 'lengthen'. On these islands, where weather is always a major topic of conversation, it's not surprising that what people noted about the days of Lent was that they got longer, no more of those ghastly dark tea-times. But the lengthening is all part of item 4 really – moving towards new life. Sadly items 4 and 5 don't apply in Australia and New Zealand, but doubtless they have compensations.

Given these five splendidly positive things about Lent, we should approach its rigours with joyful hearts!

First of all, many thanks to those of you who have supported the monthly Fairtrade Stall, which raised £45 in December and £70 in January. The next stall will be after the service on 7th February.

At the end of February Fairtrade Fortnight starts, it runs from 29th February to 13th March this year. The slogan for the fortnight is:

'Sit down for breakfast, stand up for farmers!'

As Martin Luther King famously said, 'before you finish eating breakfast in the morning, you've depended on more than half the *world'*. Think about where your breakfast comes from. Tea from India or Kenya, coffee from Ethiopia or Honduras, bananas from Colombia or the Windward islands, sugar from Malawi or Fiji. What work by farmers may have gone into producing these products? Many are unaware that sometimes those who produce our food don't earn enough to know where THEIR next meal is coming from.

Despite our dependence on farmers and workers for the

foods, drinks and products that we love, about 795 million people are undernourished globally.

Fairtrade works to change this, because it ensures that producers receive a fair price, can work in decent conditions and the environment is respected. By using Fairtrade products as part of our breakfast and other meals we can support farmers and workers to put food on the table for their own families. So look out for Fairtrade breakfast ideas: muesli, dried fruit, honey, marmalade on our stall and in the shops, and start the day feeling good! - Judith Gerrard.


