PASTORIAL LETTER

Several years ago, a new and enthusiastic church member came to see me. He told me that he was absolutely convinced that God had called him to go and be a missionary in South America. When I asked him why he explained that he

had been eating a chocolate bar whilst praying

and he suddenly realised it was full of brazil nuts. I had to stop myself commenting that I was glad it hadn't been a Mars bar!

To know that God calls us is something very special but can also be hard to define. What is God calling me to do? Why me when everyone else seems so much more qualified? I'm not sure I'm up to the job......

Yet the Bible is full of people who are called by God to do a particular task and then, like the rest of us, they make excuses and get things wrong. I take great comfort from this. For example: Jeremiah said he was too young; Isaiah thought he was not good enough; Elijah ran away; Moses said he's got a stutter; Sarah thought it was all a joke; Jonah simply refused; Peter & his friends consistently got the wrong idea about who Jesus was and what it meant to follow him.

If you read the Bible you will find a catalogue of people who God calls but who make mistakes; thankfully they usually realise they must trust in God and are able to fulfil their calling, but it is often not easy.

It can be hard to discern what we are called to as individuals, but do we have a calling as God's people, the church? In recent weeks, across the circuit, we have gained from following themed services based on the Our calling priorities of the church. This has enabled us to refocus on all we are called to be as the Methodist church in this place.

As a church we are called to worship – not just to 'going through the motions' on a Sunday but to commune with God and each other; to make deep connections of heart and mind that inspire our life and transform our choices. 2 We are called to nurture faith, to value experiences of learning and to offer opportunities for people to explore and grow their faith.

We are called to support those most in need in our communities and to work for justice in our world. And finally, we are called to share the story of our faith with those around us.

At the recent circuit consultation, we took this one step further and asked how 'Our Calling' might affect the future of our churches as we consider plans for growth or even end of life.

For those who could not be there, it was an excellent evening in which we thought not only about serious issues for the life of the church but also laughed and shared together as a circuit. Many thanks to Keith, Donna & Pete who planned the evening.

So, what now? Well, we know each church must submit a plan for the future, but what does that look like? Perhaps its focus could be on the things we are called to – worship, learning, caring, serving and evangelism. Perhaps we need to be more intentional and ask the difficult questions about the events that fill our diaries – are they fulfilling the calling we have been given, or do we do them because we have always done them? However we decide to do them, may we also remember that the Bible is full of people who God called and used but who often got things wrong. So, let's not be afraid to step out in faith, to take risks and to trust in the God who turns the despair of Good Friday into the joyful hope of Easter Day!

A Prayer

Forgive us, Lord, when we insist on looking backwards to how things used to be.

Set our sights on what lies ahead. Give us fresh vision, renewed energy, rekindled hope and enthusiasm.

Guide us onwards into a future that is larger than we can imagine. Reassure us of your ongoing presence within us.

Help us in realising the potential of what we can contribute in your service. Continue to inspire and energise us in providing meeting places and deepen our profound respect for all those whom we meet, that through us people in our communities will meet and come to know Jesus, our loving Lord. **Amen**

Eco Church in action in Chinnor

Chinnor Methodist Church continues to work with the other village and Parish churches under the title of Chinnor Goes Wild, which bases its practices on the Christian charity "A Rocha UK", and, in particular, their Eco church project.

In short, the aim is to make nature - enjoying, nurturing and protecting it - a part of life for all Christians and to action the biblical message that God loves everything he has made, and wants all to work together to value and protect it.

So, what has being involved in Eco Church meant for Chinnor Methodist Church?

- providing a representative to attend co-ordinating meetings made up from reps from other churches and have been guided by local area A Rocha Project staff
- -supporting staffing of publicity events within the village.
- -completing surveys or facilitating experts to survey the flora and fauna in church grounds. (If our village churches are any thing to go by you will be surprised by what variety there is)
- -erection of bird feeders and provision of nesting boxes.
- -maintaining grounds in a way that assists nature (which can mean doing less rather than more).

If you are interested in knowing more about A Rocha projects, why not visit the A Rocha website: Arocha.org.uk or visit an A Rocha nature reserve. They have an urban community reserve at Wolf Fields, Southall and a rural project, Foxearth Nature Reserve on the Suffolk/ Essex border.

Although I have no personal knowledge of these projects, info suggests they could make for a good day out, as their publicity reports interests, peace and beauty for all ages and community members.

WORLD FAIRTRADE DAY was celebrated on 12th May.



In particular, focus was given to the endeavours of Zaytoun, an organisation whose name is seen on many products originating from Palestine. You may have seen the name on Olive Oil, Almonds or Couscous.

Also a matter of celebration is the fact that retail sales of Fairtrade goods grew by 7% in 2017. Further Divine Chocolate announced its highest ever turnover (£14million) for the year 2016-17 with sales in the US passing the \$10 million mark for the first time

Thank you for the part you may have played in achieving these encouraging figures. Every item purchased has an impact.

Every time you buy a Fairtrade item, it can be a cause for celebration for the worker or grower.

Fairtrade is unique with its principles giving cause for collaboration between businesses, consumers and campaigners. Farmers and workers have an equal say in all aspects. Fairtrade organizations seek to empower those who might otherwise not be heard. Producers are empowered to combat poverty, strengthen their position and take more control over their lives.

Fairtrade is a simple way to make a difference to the lives of the individuals who seek to sell items they grow or make. To make that difference Fairtrade organizations work to change trading practices and establish better prices, decent working conditions, and a fair deal for farmers and workers in developing countries.

gallivanting around Bournemouth in mobility scooters. Their courage and determination was an inspiration. Most of us ate more breakfast then we do at home and feasted on three course meals each evening. Food was the topic of a quiz, on the final



night and much hilarity was caused by one of the questions. One team seemed to be as merry as the guests at the wedding at Cana by the mere mention of a magnum of champagne.

On the Monday afternoon, I had arrived at the hotel stressed by the traffic jams, hot tired and concerned about the future. On the next morning, we had prayed for all who are finding life difficult and we began to make a prayer chain. On each link we wrote the names of people, we each wanted to be especially blessed. I don't know if anyone wrote my name on one, but by the end of the week I certainly did feel blessed.

Thank you everyone, who contributed to this truly refreshing week. May we all now become a blessing to others.

Data Protection and the Circuit Website

The General Data Protection Regulation became law on 25 May 2018 The TRUSTEES for METHODIST CHURCH PURPOSES (TMCP) who are the Data Controllers for all Methodist Organisations in Great Britain, has published their Managing Trustees' Privacy Notice; The privacy notice for Local Churches, Circuits and Districts within the Methodist Church in Great Britain; it can be found under 'Circuit Policies' on the Circuit Website (www.aylesburyvale.org.uk)

The notes below are a resumé of how the Website has complied with the 1998 Act and how we will continue in compliance with GDPR in accordance with the TMCP Policy

How and what is the Data recorded on the Website?

Data recorded in the Circuit Directory was transferred to the Circuit Website Data Base in 2015, where it is stored under varying degrees of PASSWORD PROTECTION and has been updated in accordance with Circuit and Church meeting decisions over the past 34 months.

What data is recorded?

The **Data Base** includes members who have an official church or Circuit appointment, in most cases we hold the following data:

- 1. Title (Rev, Mr, Mrs, etc.....)
- 2. Full name
- 3. Sex
- 4. Address
- 5. Tel. Nos.
- 6. Email address if known

7. Personal and sensitive data.

Each person can be assigned to groups, which by implication shows them to be:

- a) a Member of the Methodist Church,
- b) the church at which they are recorded as a member
- c) an Officer in a church or the Circuit. e.g. Steward, Local Preacher, Secretary etc.
- d) a Visiting Preacher

Where the data is held?

The data is held in secure cloud storage by: ThenMedia Ltd 2 Well House Barns, Chester Road, Bretton, Chester CH4 0DH

What may this Data be used for?

- a) for communication purposes within this Circuit
- b) for inclusion in financial papers e.g. Lists of Gift Aid Donors and envelope holders
- c) for updating the Connexional Data Base (Methodist Online Data site)
- d) for updating Church Directories
- e) for inclusion in the Circuit Preaching Plan.
- f) for inclusion in the Circuit Directory
- g) for possible inclusion in the Circuit Magazine with photographs
- h) for possible inclusion in Website articles with photographs
- i) for possible inclusion in Village notices of church events & services.

How can that data be checked or challenged?

A member can ask to see their profile which can be provide as a .pdf document.

Members who have 'Cloud Access' can see the data in 'People' and 'Groups' on the Data Base.

Members who have no access to the Circuit Website can obtain their records on application to their Minister, Church Stewards or Church Secretaries who can access the information or request it from the Website Manager.

Concerns about the data usage can be raised with the Website Manager via the CONTACT page.

Your record will be destroyed when you cease to have contact with this Circuit and will not be passed to any organisation outside Methodism without your expressed consent.

GDPR

The affect upon the CIRCUIT WEBSITE, YOU and your CHURCH

CIRCUIT WEBSITE: All data on individuals will need to be obtained, retained and used, in accordance with the principles set out in the TMCP Privacy Policy. See pages 24 –25 for greater detail.

You: If you are an Office Holder in the Circuit or a church, your name may be on the Circuit Data Base and in the Circuit Directory. You may need to give your consent if any of your personal details may be publish in the Public Domain e.g on the Plan as traditionally printed and/or published on the Websites (you will be advised how and when this should be done).
