#### **PASTORIAL LETTER**



## **Rev Helen Kirk**

When my youngest son was 6 years old, he was given the role of a wise man in the local children's nativity. The part consisted of dressing up in a robe and crown, walking onto the stage, kneeling solemnly before the

Christ child and as he gently laid a gift in the crib he had to say: 'Here is Myrrh'. We practised at home. What could possibly go wrong?

When the great day came there was a problem, Sam was always a little boy and so the robe he had to wear swamped him and the crown slipped down over his eyes. The evening of the performance arrived and as he walked onto the stage his crown slipped once more covering his whole face. He lifted this temporary blindfold, saw for the first time the large audience and panicked: all rehearsals went of the window as he threw his gift at Mary and shouted, 'There's more!'

We so often lump the wise men or magi into the nativity story and yet theirs is really a separate tale; in fact, it has its own season called Epiphany. The feast epiphany is on 6<sup>th</sup> January every year - not that we really celebrate this in the Methodist church. However in some parts of the world Epiphany is a big deal: this is the day children open presents; many countries have their own version of a special epiphany cake and in some communities songs that are sung from house to house (In England we used to call this wassailing)

So, does it matter that often our only nod to Epiphany is that we remember it as the day we have to take down the Christmas decorations? I think Epiphany and the story of the Magi have much to teach us as we begin the new year:

It is a story about searching for God and finding him in unexpected places; of stepping out in faith and not quite knowing where we'll end up; of going in the wrong direction but not giving up. And when we finally realise what matters most we become willing to stand up to others who might have a very different agenda.

We do not know what 2019 will hold for any of us, in our personal lives, our churches or our nation: for some it may offer opportunities and new beginnings, for others great change and upheaval. Perhaps in 2019 we need to 'get wise' -

To look for God's presence in the midst of our world for that is his promise – a faithful and constant presence. Will we realise him? Be surprised by him or be too preoccupied to look?

To trust in his guidance even if he might take us in directions we do not want to go.

To have a hope that is beyond the everydayness of our lives; that lifts our heads and, in small ways, gives us the courage to live justly and generously.

Just like my son, we may not always get it right but with God there is always more (not myrrh) – the best is yet to come!

I moved into the Circuit on July 2018 with my wife Agnes after a nine-year stay in London. I candidated for the ordained ministry from the

Scotland District in 1987, in my final year as a postgraduate student of the University of Strathclyde. Before that I was employed by Woodlands Road Methodist Church (Glasgow) to offer pastoral support to overseas students in the then two universities of Glasgow (Glasgow and Strathclyde). I trained for the ministry at Wesley House from 1988 to 1991 completing the Cambridge Theology Tripos as an affiliated student of Fitzwilliam College in 1990. My first circuit appointment was in September 1991 in the Goole Circuit in the then Yorkshire District. I was ordained the following year at the Newcastle Conference. My family and I moved to the Leeds District in 1993 and served in the Pudsey & Farsley Circuit for 7 years. I was then stationed in the Bradford West Circuit, West Yorkshire District in 2000 as a Superintendent Minister for 9 years. This was followed by my final circuit appointment in the Lesnes Abbey Circuit in the London District first as a circuit minister and later as a Superintendent minister from September 2010.

Agnes and I have been blessed with three children: Rhoda (Pharmacist & actress), Grace (Consultant Psychiatrist & Scriptwriter) and Samuel (Dentist). Agnes is a social care worker. We are eagerly exploring the beautiful environment and getting to know people and the churches in the Circuit. Thank you for the warm welcome you have given us.

Rev Ofori-Attah serves in the circuit as a Supernumerary minister.

## **COVER STORY** from **STONE**



The cover photo is a *FIRST SUNDAY* **CAFÉ** with customers enjoying chicken drumsticks in Henry VIII style: no bones on the floor though! All profits from that day went to the DEC Emergency Appeal for the victims of the Indonesian earthquake / tsunami; in total we sent over £200.00.

The Café has been a successful venture, but in a different way to that which we intended! We wanted to raise funds for a

much-needed toilet suitable for the elderly and disabled who use the Chapel. We hoped that it would attract passing bikers and hikers, enjoying the beautiful countryside around the village; hardly any came! <u>But</u> village folk came, enjoyed their meal and fellowship together, and continue to come. Several regular 'customers' are elderly and live alone and a meal shared in friendly company is a real treat for them. We almost decided to have a day off on Easter Sunday but were very pleased we didn't when one lady told us, "I'm so glad to come here today, as otherwise I would have seen no-one over the whole weekend."

When our new toilet was completed, it was decided to use the money raised to refurbish the Chapel kitchen; this project is now well under way.

The Chapel plays a central part in village life: letting charges help to maintain the building; more importantly, regular use keeps the Chapel's profile in the minds of our neighbours. Local artists have a weekly meeting, the over 60s Club meets monthly as does the Open Fellowship. The WEA hold two termly sessions, the U3A Photo Group meet regularly, a Walkers' Group call in for refreshments following their fortnightly rambles. Most importantly, the *Sees the Day* group {for those with learning/physical problems] come along twice every week for their folk to enjoy a quiet time of activities and friendly contact. There's always a special Coffee and Carol morning in December hosted by *Sees the Day* to which all friends and neighbours are invited when we sing carols and hear the Christmas story.

While worship and prayer are the prime 'reason to be', an integral part of working out '*Our Calling*' is fund raising for various Charities and this plays a large part in the Chapel's life and witness: Christian Aid, WaterAid, Leprosy Mission, Mission Aviation Fellowship, Bible Society and Whitechapel Mission, are just some who benefit each year. Then there's our big effort for the local work of Action for Children – December Saturdays Soup Lunches - when a wide assortment of delicious soups can be enjoyed for a donation.

## Eco Church in action in Chinnor

Is your treasurer looking at the cost of heating your Church over the Winter months?

Could the cost be reduced? Eco church invites both churches and their individual members to assess their fuel consumption and consider what could be done to reduce consumption and maximise the benefits of the fuel used.

At Chinnor the treasurer reports a significant reduction in costs since the revamp. Those using the premises benefit from rooms reaching a good temperature more speedily, in part through an updated boiler and in part through improved heat retention. Obviously the supplier chosen is also a factor in determining cost. If considering a change, Eco Church would encourage checking out those suppliers that operate on Eco friendly practices.

# Enquiry

Has anyone come across, or have experience of schemes where churches combine to buy fuel supplies? I came across a website (see below) giving info about a company called '2buy2', which by its name indicates it has a church focus.

The link takes you to a site which has a Methodist Church heading and highlights how a group of churches can bulk buy and get reductions as a result.

It may be that it would be worthwhile finding out how many might know about or be interested in this scheme that appears to be supported by the Methodist Church.

## Fairtrade

Many of you will have read or heard about how Traidcraft has been assessing its viability to continue trading.

In September 2018, after some 40 years of trading, market conditions and exchange rates led Traidcraft to announce it was handing out redundancy notices and needed to revisit its trading model.

In November 2018, after consultations Traidcraft announced it would continue trading.

The process has not been easy for Traidcraft or many of its craft suppliers some of whom have been informed that no more orders will be placed.

So what does it mean?

#### Traidcraft will:

-continue to operate but based on a different model from 2019 with a reduced staff.

-return to its roots of operating more through churches. (85% of Fairtraders are motivated by faith.)

-concentrate on more profitable lines.

-offer fewer craft lines.

- -establish more grocery lines
- -set a new higher bar for ethical trading.

-develop means to respond to new shopping trends, including vegan and organic, alongside Fairtrade.

-encourage practices and sales methods to reduce packaging and transport.

While there will be changes at Traidcraft, producers will also be able to find outlets for their fair trade products through other companies and businesses.

As for Traidcraft, there is still an element of 'watch this space' in terms of seeing what lines will be retained or introduced and how they showcase their products. (ie electronically or catalogues or both). This will become clearer as 2019 progresses and the new model comes into effect.

### **Circuit wise**

- -Fairtrade items will still be available through Rod Thorpe.
- -Please get in touch if you would like to place an order- with sufficient notice, it is possible to bring ordered items to Circuit meetings.
- -Please self assess whether your church is maintaining the necessary commitment to be considered a Fairtrade church
- -Remember, regular orders allow for bulk buying and sharing orders between churches and customers at a cheaper price.

### Easter 2019

If you are reading this in January it may seem premature to be thinking about Easter, particularly as in 2019 it is about as late as it can get. When you do get round to buying Easter Eggs please remember to check out the Fairtrade options and whether the Real Easter Egg, with its leaflet telling the story of Easter, might be an option. Alternative, 'free from' ethical options are also available.

## **Toilet Twinning**

Many churches, individuals and organisations have twinned their toilets with another in part of the world where facilities for, and education about, managing human waste need improving. It may be you or your church has already received congratulations for twinning one or each of your toilets!

The benefits of personal hygiene and sanitation are well known to many. By twinning a toilet this knowledge is shared and facilities are improved.

For a flat payment of  $\pounds 60$  (the average cost for improving a latrine), you get a framed certificate, giving the location of a toilet of your choosing from a list of countries in Africa and Asia. The improved latrines usually involve local people in the design and choice of materials; a practice that means the facility is appropriate, sustainable and affordable.

# **Buried Treasure**

"The Kingdom of Heaven is like treasure hidden in a field." That's what Jesus said.

I've always liked stories about buried treasure and when I visited the small Norfolk town of Swaffham, last autumn, I indulged my passion for them, when I wandered in the church, market place and museum.

The North aisle of the church was financed, in the fifteenth century, by John Chapman, who was then a church warden and much is made of his story. He is said to have been a pedlar who had a dream, that if he went to London Bridge he would hear something to his advantage. He set off at once with his dog and waited there for something to happen. After three days he met a man in a shop, who said he had a dream, in which treasure was found under a tree in the garden of a pedlar, who lived in Swaffham. John went home, dug in his garden and found an old pot. He didn't think much about it, until one day a monk, who was travelling to the shrine at



Walsingham, read the Latin inscription on it which indicated, that there had been another pot beside it in the ground. John found the second crock. This time it held enough gold to greatly enhance the church building fund.

On a small car park, near the market place, I took a photograph of the town sign on which John Chapman, the Swaffham pedlar, is depicted. This sign was the first of the many Norfolk signs

embellished with gold leaf, made by Harry Carter, who was a teacher at the local grammar school in the mid twentieth century. The artistic talent runs in Harry's family, for he was a relative of Howard Carter, the artist who discovered Tutankhamun's tomb. In the museum, an Egyptian themed room is dedicated to the memory of Howard Carter, who stayed with his aunt in Swaffham during his childhood. A model of an engine, a lectern and a model of the town, all made by Harry Carter, are also on display there. I was particularly interested in the Carter connection as Harry's son, Tony Carter, taught Geography and Geology at Wymondham College when I was a pupil there. He drew amazing cross sections of the earth on the blackboard, that other masters were reluctant to rub out. Wymondham College is only a few miles from Swaffham.

At that time the permanent school houses were being built and there was great excitement, when two workmen found a pot of silver Anglo-Saxon coins on the site. It was declared Treasure Trove at the inquest held at the College, and most of the horde is now in Norwich Castle Museum.

I think perhaps there is a message here. John Chapman went all the way to London, to seek his fortune and Howard Carter travelled all the way to Egypt, but all the while riches lay hidden almost under their noses. Maybe we don't have to go very far to find the Kingdom of Heaven either, for Jesus also said, "The Kingdom of Heaven is within you."

Aylesbury Church on 27<sup>th</sup> November, which was very moving and a great tribute.

I met Des and his family when Janet and I moved to Aylesbury in 1963 – he and his family had moved to Aylesbury in 1961. To me he was always a real 'gentleman' in the best sense of the word. I thought he was one of the best Local Preachers I ever heard! I took my final LP exam at Aylesbury in 1965 and Des who had been fully accredited for ten years was also taking a voluntary advanced preaching paper at the same time, which really showed his dedication as a preacher.

I always thought his biblical knowledge and ability to explain the scripture and apply it to today's world was outstanding. I think he owned a Greek new testament and so was able to go to the source of our scripture much better than the rest of us.

Des was also very dedicated to the work of the Junior Church and was leader of the Junior Department at Aylesbury for very many years. Once he and I were asked by the superintendent to consider reducing our Junior Church work to do more preaching. We looked at the plan and found that apart from Mr. Angood at Princes Risborough, who used to preach nearly every Sunday, Des and I preached as often as the other Local Preachers so we declined to change as both thought work with children was exceedingly important. Those were the days when there were plenty of afternoon and evening services for us to be planned at! He and I were always good friends but laughed when we had to prepare a service together, say for Junior Church Anniversary, because we could never initially agree on the hymns. He of course was part of a very musical family so probably his choice was better than mine. For many years he ran a house group where we discussed many biblical and non-biblical topics which I always found stimulating and good sources of sermon material.

Des was born in Plymouth in 1925 and moved to Birkenhead when he was 4. His father was a merchant navy sea captain and was away a lot. There were two Methodist Churches close by in Birkenhead but the one his family attended had no youth club so he sneaked off to the other one which did. It was there he first met Kath whom he married sometime later. He trained as an architect at the Liverpool Scholl of Architecture and then was called to do his national Service in 1948 and was drafted into the Fleet Air Arm. He was very technically minded and worked with radio and radar. He spent some time in what was then Ceylon and enjoyed dinghy sailing very much.

After his service he married Kath and their first home was in Bristol. As he worked as an architect for the local authority, when he needed a move for promotion he could choose from many places and he always tried to find a town that he thought would be a very pleasant place to live. After Bristol they lived in Cambridge then Matlock before coming to Aylesbury.

He retired from active preaching in 2016 at the age of 91! So we sadly say God Bless to a good friend and ask that God's blessing will be with Kath and the rest of the family.

# Stoke Hammond !!!!!



For many of you in the circuit Stoke Hammond is just the name of a church on the circuit preaching plan. Yet for those who have visited the chapel you will know that it is a friendly congregation, small in number, but always faithful.

Stoke Hammond Methodist Church was open in October 1927. When the Old Wesleyan Chapel in Chapel Yard became inhabitable, the Methodist families of Stoke Hammond worked hard to build a new Chapel. The parents of Mary Bonner and Margaret Aitken were heavily involved in the building of the Chapel. When the Chapel opened in October 1927, Margaret's father opened up a new village shop on the same day and recalls it being a fantastic day full of much excitement and celebration.

Stoke Hammond Methodist Church was known for its Sunday School, there was not one at the Anglican Church so most of the children in the village attended the chapel for Sunday School. There were two sessions, 10.30am (for an hour) and at 2pm just before the afternoon service. Sunday school was a big part of the life of Stoke Hammond and most of its current members were part of the Sunday school and have fond memories of Sunday School parties and outings to Wickstead Park near Kettering.

This snippet of history is a reminder of the wonderful witness and service that Stoke Hammond Methodist Church has offered to the village for over 90 years. Sadly, in recent years the congregation has dwindled despite efforts to reach out to the community. At the autumn Church council, the trustees were faced with a significant property bill and made the decision to cease to worship. This was not an easy decision but one that was supported by all the remaining members.

The Methodist church has certain procedures to follow before Stoke Hammond can be officially closed. The Circuit meeting and District synod need to approve the decision and so in the meantime there will continue to be a regular shared service with our Anglican friends in the village and the Wednesday coffee mornings will still go ahead. We will also be having a community Carol service on 23<sup>rd</sup> December at 3.00pm to which you are all invited.

On 28th April we will be inviting the whole circuit to a service of thanksgiving for the witness and service of the chapel over the years. This will be the final service in the chapel.

The congregation at Stoke Hammond feel a deep sense of loss however they also feel that this is the right thing to do. They are already looking to joining with their neighbouring churches in the new year.

Please hold them in your prayers at this time.
