PASTORIAL LETTER



Rev Helen Kirk

Prayer is something we know we should do but often struggle with. Are we doing it right? Is there a special formula that will make my prayers work? What should I pray for?

I once heard a 10-year-old boy, who obviously had not revised for a geography test coming out of the exam praying 'Dear God, please make Sydney the capital of New Zealand!'

I doubt that God answered his prayer! However, it does offer an illustration of what so many of us do when we pray – we tell God what we want. Let's be honest, that's often where we start.

Yet prayer is not about talking to God but about listening; listening to the agendas of our own hearts, the fears that fill our mind, the uncertainties that we face and the struggles that are all around us, but that we cannot seem to change. We first listen to ourselves and our world and in prayer bring them into the silence of God.

To quote Mother Theresa 'We need to find God and he cannot be found in noise and restlessness. God is the friend of silence... the more we receive in silent prayer, the more we can give in our active life'.

It feels as though we are living through extraordinary times: our nation is divided by differing ideologies that challenge our identity; there is deep anger towards our politicians and leaders and bubbling under parts of our society are signs of shocking racism.

This uncertainty is a global condition as populist or nationalist policies are pursued across the world and our planet struggles to cope with the effects of our selfish human choices.

Maybe this is where prayer comes in; not hands together eyes closed prayer but listening prayer. Prayer that is realised when we truly listen to each other and hear views and opinions that challenge our own; prayer that happens when we listen to our own fears, admitting that we do not have all the answers but need the grace of God; prayer that demands we put aside our agenda and are open to that which is 'other' than ourselves.

The question then becomes not 'how do I pray' but how do I become the answer to my prayer. As Karl Barth once wrote: 'To clasp hands in prayer is the beginning of an uprising against the disorder of the world'

Maybe that is our calling today.

Swanbourne Barn Service

What we are now calling the Swanbourne Barn Service rather than Open Air Service had its origins with our decision to celebrate the hundredth anniversary of our current chapel building – built in 1907, to replace the first chapel which was built in 1858. 2007 was also the 200th anniversary of the first camp meeting, held at Mow Cop on the Cheshire-Staffordshire border, which led to the creation of the Primitive Methodism Church. The Methodist Church of the time regarded this open air meeting with suspicion, and ejected the organisers, two local preachers - Hugh Bourne and William Clowes, from the Methodist Church when they refused to stop organising these open air meetings. Denied readmittance, Bourne and Clowes set up what eventually became known as the Primitive Methodist Church. The name reflected their view that they were just doing what Jesus and the original Christians had done.

As the Swanbourne chapel is small, and we expected a large congregation, the idea of an outdoor service seemed like a good way of marking both the anniversaries of Primitive Methodism and of the Swanbourne Chapel, as well as overcoming the space restrictions. The Rev Dr. Lord Leslie Griffiths was invited to be our preacher, and the Marsdens offered their farm for the occasion. The Chapel was left free for the provision of refreshments, and members of Secklow Brass provided the music.

It was not until 2010 that a second Open Air service was organised at Swanbourne – and on this occasion, the weather was not so kind, and we retreated to the nearby Barn which had been held in reserve. Since then, the Open Air Service has become an annual event, but too often it has been too wet, too windy or too hot for the open air, and so now we have decided that we will use the Barn whatever.

In more recent years, we have organised activities for young people in the afternoon, and we have also had the Aylesbury Youth Choir giving wonderful performances to add to the atmosphere. This year, we were hoping that we could hold the service a week after Rev Donna's ordination, but this proved not to be possible.

LIVE-STREAMING OF SERVICES

Background

As one of the marks of a healthy church is to have an outward-looking focus, we now live-stream our 10.30am Sunday services with a static video camera. Anyone with an internet connection will be able to see and hear them via www.thesundayservice.org.uk and YouTube. We are one of eight churches nationally, of various denominations taking part in this free trial. It is organised by The Sunday Service, a Christian charity funded by The Joseph Rank Foundation. Their prime aim is to reach people unable to attend church through sickness, being house-bound or in residential care. Other groups, such as our own members who are temporarily indisposed and people moving into the area might also benefit.

Our Policies

1. To safeguard children and vulnerable adults, the only camera shots used, apart from the choir, will be on the sanctuary side, rather than the congregational side of the communion rail. This creates a 'virtual safety curtain'.
2. All children and young people asked to take part in a service by, for instance, reading a lesson, lighting an advent calendar, singing in the Youth Choir, or taking part in a Youth Service, will each need to have written parental permission to do so.
3. 'Known participants' in a service who will be in camera shot in the sanctuary area, such as preachers, worship leaders, readers, sketch participants, baptismal parties and others, will be informed of our live-streaming policies beforehand. Their participation signals their permission to be filmed.

LIVE-STREAMING OF SERVICES (Cont.)

4. ‘Unknown participants’ in a service, such as volunteers from J Team invited to help a preacher in the sanctuary area will not be filmed. This is because it is neither possible nor desirable for the camera operator or youth leaders to ensure only those with parental permission forms can respond. A ‘safe’ shot will be used instead, such as the choir or the central banner.

5. Whilst we will make every effort to ensure a safe environment for all, given the widespread use of mobile phones as cameras, the church and most other public places are not ‘camera-free zones.’ Nor can we always avoid the potential for some toddlers and/or a retrieving parent to creep into camera shot.

6. Based on advice from Boys’ Brigade HQ, we will use the same permission form on church letter-heading for all our youth organisations.

7. A succinct message about our live-streaming will be included in the Welcome slides shown before the start of the service and in the weekly notices.

8. A leaflet will be made available explaining our live-streaming and safeguarding policies and the Church Stewards will be responsible for ensuring that preachers and all service participants are made aware of them.

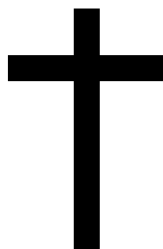

Campaigns

Please watch out for and do what you can to support the new campaigns regarding Cocoa and introducing the practice of paying a 'Living Income'.

Many of you will be familiar with the terms 'minimum wage' and 'living wage' but may be less so with the term 'living income'.

As a producer or farmer, there is no one to pay your wage. Without guarantees that payments for products will cover the cost of production or growing, there can be shortfalls. If shortfalls persist this gives rise to debt, loss of stability and poverty.

Fairtrade provides a means for producers to have a more secure income and livelihood, enabling them to provide for themselves, their families and their community.

As an example, Cote d'Ivoire is a major producer of Cocoa used for chocolate bars. Only 6% of their cocoa producers operate under Fairtrade conditions. As a result of a drop in Cocoa prices in 2018, incomes have dropped and communities affected.

If the practice of a living income were to be applied it would help smooth the impact of the drop in prices. The impact and hardships arising of the reduced prices would be lessened. Recently reported figures highlight farmers are receiving \$1 a day when \$2.50 a day is required to provide a living income.

The proposal is for a 3 year campaign to stimulate discussions to introduce Living Incomes and ease the consequence of swings in trade to producers, individuals, families and communities. visit www.fairtradefoundation.org or contact Rod Thorpe 351565 for more info.

EASYFUNDRAISING

This means of fundraising may not be for all but it can provide an additional income stream of funds just by going about everyday or those occasional transactions.

At Chinnor, from a relatively small number of members and their extended families, it has been possible to generate a few hundred pounds to add to the church coffers.

If you are booking a holiday, arranging insurance, buying electrical goods or just buying everyday items, as long as the company used is part of the scheme, a specified percentage is added to the fund, which is then paid quarterly to your cause.

Stoke Hammond !!!!!

For many of you in the circuit Stoke Hammond is just the name of a church on the circuit preaching plan. Yet for those who have visited the chapel you will know that it is a friendly congregation, small in number, but always faithful.

Stoke Hammond Methodist Church was opened in October 1927.

When the Old Wesleyan Chapel in Chapel Yard became inhabitable, the Methodist families of Stoke Hammond worked hard to build a new Chapel. The parents of Mary Bonner and Margaret Aitken were heavily involved in the building of the Chapel. When the Chapel opened in October 1927, Margaret's father opened up a new village shop on the same day and recalls it being a fantastic day full of much excitement and celebration.

Stoke Hammond Methodist Church was known for its Sunday School, there was not one at the Anglican Church so most of the children in the village attended the chapel for Sunday School. There were two sessions, 10.30am (for an hour) and at 2pm just before the afternoon service. Sunday school was a big part of the life of Stoke Hammond and most of its current members were part of the Sunday school and have fond memories of Sunday School parties and outings to Wickstead Park near Kettering.

This snippet of history is a reminder of the wonderful witness and service that Stoke Hammond Methodist Church has offered to the village for over 90 years.

Sadly, in recent years the congregation has dwindled despite efforts to reach out to the community. At the Autumn Church Council, the trustees were faced with a significant property bill and made the decision to cease to worship. This was not an easy decision but one that was supported by all the remaining members.

The Methodist church has certain procedures to follow before Stoke Hammond can be officially closed. The Circuit meeting and District synod need to approve the decision and so in the meantime there will continue to be a regular shared service with our Anglican friends in the village and the Wednesday coffee mornings will still go ahead.

The congregation at Stoke Hammond feel a deep sense of loss however they also feel that this is the right thing to do. Since the new year they have found a welcome in neighbouring churches . Please hold them in your prayers at this time.

On 28th April 2019 the whole Circuit is invited to a service of thanksgiving for the witness and service of the chapel over the years.

This will be the final service in the chapel.
