From the Manse ...

Dear Friends, as you read this, Lent nears its end, leading us into Holy Week and Easter. This period in particular is the core of Christian faith, guiding believers through a deep journey of reflection, sacrifice, and renewal.



For years, I dreamt of spending Lent, Holy Week, and Easter in Jerusalem. During the Lenten season in 1993, that dream came true. I'll never forget the excitement of first visiting Jerusalem, when I spent a year in Israel. I travelled from Nazareth to Jerusalem in a shared taxi called a "Sherut"—a five-hour ride with five mission team members from Switzerland, America, Australia, Britain, and Holland. Jerusalem is a city cherished by three major religions: Judaism, Christianity, and Islam.

Some say the city has as many as 70 names. In Hebrew, Yerushalayim translates to "City of Peace" or "Vision of Peace." In Arabic, the city is called Al-Quds, meaning "The Holy City." For Christians, it's called the "City of David." All three faiths call it holy and claim to follow a God of peace. You'd expect it to be the most peaceful and holy place on earth.

But when we arrived, peace was nowhere to be found. Instead, we saw soldiers, police, and automatic weapons—a city heavy with tension, violence, and chaos. It made me think: no wonder Jesus, the Prince of Peace, the holy one, was born there.

Much like the period of Lent, today's world is shadowed by war, conflict, climate change, food shortages, and international political unrest, leaving us with uncertainty and fear for the future. Yet, Easter offers a promise of hope and transformation. It calls us to work together for a renewed world—where peace rules, nature flourishes, the hungry are fed, the imprisoned are set free, and justice prevails for all.

For us, the journey doesn't stop on Easter Sunday. Christ's resurrection urges us to live as witnesses of His love, shining the light of faith into our everyday lives. Through Him, we're offered a new life—free from sin and filled with grace. Let's celebrate this gift with family and community, rejoicing in the hope it brings.

May this season change our hearts and inspire us to live as true followers of the Risen Lord. Blessings

Princes Centre — March Update

The weather has not been too kind recently which has limited some external activities. The clients THE PRINCES CENTRE are looking forward to some more outdoor games, walks and trips. Our gardening group have potted up some vegetable and herb seeds which are



being nursed indoors until the better weather comes. One of the clients made a bird house for the garden and others have made some bird food and hung it outside for the birds. We received some lovely roses from the Co-op and the clients enjoyed making their own arrangements to take home.

The staff think up all sorts of activities to help our clients keep as mentally alert and mobile as possible and try to include everyone, whatever their capabilities. Activities include artwork, craft work, making heart-shaped wreaths, and using crisp packets to make blankets for the homeless. Regular activities such as cooking, singing, ball games, bingo etc continue. Quieter activities include story writing and pampering sessions. One group who are interested in current affairs had a visit from our local MP Greg Smith and our chairman Matt, who is a Buckinghamshire Councillor, for a Q & A session and to discuss local issues. The Community Police also visited and gave the clients a talk on how to stay safe and not succumb to being scammed in any way. The Red Cross came and ran a First Aid workshop with the clients.

We have some new volunteers. We are always grateful for volunteers' input and appreciative of the time they give to the Centre. We are pleased that the new roof is finished and the solar panels have been re-installed and the new fascia at the front of the building is looking really attractive.

CTR : Churches Together in Risborough

At the CTR meeting held on January 21st, the decision was made (following a pre-meeting of the clergy that the format for Lent Groups would be similar to last year. Each church

would decide what (if anything) they wanted to offer their own members, as the needs of each church were seen to be different. Those that wished to would make information about their Lent course available so that members of other churches could join if they wished. St Dunstan's in Monks Risborough, St John's in Lacey Green and Kimble Free Church have offered information on their Lent studies.

On Good Friday, following our joint service with the Baptist Church and Kimble Free Church (which will be held in the Baptist Church this year at 10am), all churches will gather in the Market Square for the CTR service which begins at 11am. Following feedback from last year, the aim is for this service to last for approx. 30 minutes as most people will have to stand during the service. Early risers on Easter Sunday can attend the short service on Whiteleaf Hill above the Cross at 6am, which I assume will be followed by refreshments in the Whiteleaf Hill Car Park.

It was noted that 2025 is a Year of Jubilee as celebrated in the Catholic Church. It is a year of forgiveness and mercy and a time to reset our relationship with God, one another and all of creation. St Teresa's will be holding a number of talks during the year (the 1st was on Feb 19th) and further information will be made available when received.

St John's in Lacey Green will be celebrating their 200th Anniversary during the period from 28th June to 6th July. Activities planned include 'Beating the Bounds' of the Parish, Songs of Praise, Tours of History and Flower exhibition in the church, Organ Concert with details to come nearer to the time.

Following the departure of a member of staff last year, Wycombe Youth for Christ have had to cut back on the work they were doing with students from Princes Risborough School, but continue to ask for our prayers to support their efforts to recruit more staff and develop their work in all areas around Wycombe.

2025 World Day of Prayer.

The World Day of Prayer this year focused on The Cook Islands. A distributed population of under 15,000 people across 15 islands. The Islands became Christian just over 200 years ago. The population is mainly Polynesian from neighbouring islands to the East, English and Maori are spoken. Women hold leadership



roles in all aspects of life, however, domestic violence still goes unreported. Adult literacy is 95%, primary and secondary education is free. There are two tertiary establishments, one for the University of the South Pacific and the other for the Cook Island Tertiary Training Institute, and about 80% of the population has participated in tertiary education. Medical and health provision are improving and these islands now have the lowest child mortality rates in the South Pacific with no maternal deaths since 1995.

In our WDoP service we heard the words of 3 women spoken by a member from one of the participating churches: Mii, a girl of 15 years terrified during the COVID pandemic; Vainiu, who struggled with the devaluing of the Maori culture as English/American was considered 'better', and wished to protect her traditional culture; and Dr Dawn, the first female doctor in the Cook Islands paediatric department. She highlighted the improvements but also promoted the need for screening programmes for cancer, work in mental health, teenage pregnancy, care for the elderly and prevention of communicable disease.

The congregation of over 40, gamefully attempted hymns in Maori, as well as English written by Cook Islanders with a theme 'We are wonderfully made by God'.

We were hosted at St Dunstan's, and were grateful for St Dunstan's choir who led our singing, and the organist. We collected about £306 plus gift aid in donations. Hospitality was provided afterwards.

Next year's event will be at St Johns's, Lacey Green as they celebrate their 200th year.
