An Introduction to Rev Richard Atkinson and Family



When the list of available appointments was published it provides a geography test as you try to work out where various places are. Aylesbury, I confess required a map to discover its precise location. We have spent the last twenty-one years on familiar ground living in places of which we had knowledge and experience beforehand,

moving to somewhere new is a bit like our first appointment which was very much a venture into the unknown. However, as Methodists, one is always aware of our Connexional nature which usually manifests itself with people with whom there is a link. We have already "discovered" three people who know friends of ours and there will be doubtless be more connections once we arrive. This is one of the things I love about our Church, these connections that hopefully make new surroundings feel less intimidating, that remind us we are one family.

So time to write the 'here we come' letter and give you a little insight into what you might expect.

I suppose I am becoming a veteran, as the Vale of Aylesbury will be my fifth appointment as a Methodist minister having previously served in Nottingham, Clitheroe, Bradford (as a school chaplain) and latterly in Skipton where we have been for the last 10 years. Prior to candidating I spent four years teaching history in Tunbridge Wells. I am a proud Lancastrian having been born in North Manchester and then moved around the north of England with my Dad's job. Aylesbury will be home number 17, so moving is nothing new and offers an opportunity to have a clear out!!

My wife Louise and I will celebrate our 28th wedding anniversary the day after we move into the Manse. She is a teacher of History, vice principal in her current school. She has always been involved in church life pursuing her cherished ambition of one day being a "proper minister's wife!!"

We have two; Ben will be 25 soon after we arrive. He has a Masters in Music then spent eighteen months living and working in France and Germany before returning home to work as a teaching assistant. This resulted in him being offered a maternity cover teaching music. He has so enjoyed the experience that he will be starting a PGCE in September to become a qualified teacher. Our daughter Fran will be 22 and about to enter the final year of a Social Care degree in Cheltenham after a change of course. She is very involved in church life and will be spending some of the summer volunteering at various Christian camps sharing something of faith with the youngsters who attend. I am a huge music fan spending my last sabbatical looking at the way music influences our spirituality. Listening to music is a means of encountering God, it is one of his greatest gifts to us. In addition we are both history graduates so this influences how we like to spend our free time. Then there are the quirks; the folk in Skipton will talk of tea which is insipid without milk while the children will tell of family holidays abroad and Dad declining menus in English and risking ordering things he has no idea about what they are.

In ministry my primary hope is to enable conversations about faith within and beyond the walls of the church. Too often folk are held back because they think all around them have a stronger more confident faith, we all need the courage to display our vulnerability and dare to talk, in the hope this will aid faith development. We are all on a journey remembering key points from the past and hoping for significance looking into the future. I think this a model which enables a cherishing of what has been, alongside an enthusiasm for what will be.

Please bear with us as we try to learn names, work out relationships and how things are "normally" done. May our communal journey be one in which we all find blessing.

COVER STORY

As a result of our Away Day Consultation we have started having a Cafe Church regularly. We bought circular tables to encourage friendship and discussion. As you can see from the photo we had a



full Church with visitors from South Africa, Ghana and Princes Risborough. As it was Christian Aid week we talked and prayed about the situation in Sierra Leone. The money collected this year goes towards helping mothers there have a safe delivery of their babies.

The rooms in Christchurch are used every week by a variety of people -August being a quiet month as it is the holiday season. We have Bands, Choirs, Youth clubs, Mothers and Babies, Patchwork, and a Bridge club making use of the rooms. Plus we have a Bible Study Group, and a monthly Women's group which includes members of other Churches and non Church goers. The coffee mornings on Tuesday and on Friday are well attended.

The six Churches in Thame which includes Christchurch hold a monthly Ecumenical Prayer Meeting, called Thame in Prayer. Each month it is on a different day and at a different Church allowing more people to attend. A Women's Conference is being planned, also organised by all six Churches.

As we are an ageing Congregation we often accommodate various types of walking aids and wheel chairs. This year we have many members with a special Birthday ending in an "0". A happy, family congregation attends each week averaging about 50 people.

LIVE-STREAMING OF SERVICES

Background

As one of the marks of a healthy church is to have an outward -looking focus, we now live-stream our 10.30am Sunday services with a static video camera. Anyone with an internet connection will be able to see and hear them via www.thesundayservice.org.uk and YouTube. We are one of eight churches nationally, of various denominations taking part in this free trial. It is organised by The Sunday Service, a Christian charity funded by The Joseph Rank Foundation. Their prime aim is to reach people unable to attend church through sickness, being house-bound or in residential care. Other groups, such as our own members who are temporarily indisposed and people moving into the area might also benefit.

Our Policies

1. To safeguard children and vulnerable adults, the only camera shots used, apart from the choir, will be on the sanctuary side, rather than the congregational side of the communion rail. This creates a 'virtual safety curtain'.

2. All children and young people asked to take part in a service by, for instance, reading a lesson, lighting an advent calendar, singing in the Youth Choir, or taking part in a Youth Service, will each need to have written parental permission to do so.

3. 'Known participants' in a service who will be in camera shot in the sanctuary area, such as preachers, worship leaders, readers, sketch participants, baptismal parties and others, will be informed of our live-streaming policies beforehand. Their participation signals their permission to be filmed.

LIVE-STREAMING OF SERVICES (Cont.)

4. 'Unknown participants' in a service, such as volunteers from J Team invited to help a preacher in the sanctuary area will not be filmed. This is because it is neither possible nor desirable for the camera operator or youth leaders to ensure only those with parental permission forms can respond. A 'safe' shot will be used instead, such as the choir or the central banner.

5. Whilst we will make every effort to ensure a safe environment for all, given the widespread use of mobile phones as cameras, the church and most other public places are not 'camera-free zones.' Nor can we always avoid the potential for some toddlers and/or a retrieving parent to creep into camera shot.

6. Based on advice from Boys' Brigade HQ, we will use the same permission form on church letter-heading for all our youth organisations.

7. A succinct message about our live-streaming will be included in the Welcome slides shown before the start of the service and in the weekly notices.

8. A leaflet will be made available explaining our livestreaming and safeguarding policies and the Church Stewards will be responsible for ensuring that preachers and all service participants are made aware of them.

The church was decorated with rich and colourful Kente cloth and there was a display of artefacts and saleable items in the welcome area, which were transferred to the Hall at meal time. All the Ghanaians were in their colourful traditional attire. - *We could have done a fashion show with the cat walk.*

Welcome prayer was said by Rev. Helen Kirk. This was followed by emergency action announcement.

As the function was to support two charities i.e. Karibuni Trust based in Kenya and Alfan Foundation in Ghana, representatives of the charities - Joy Murphy and Alfons Hanson were invited to enlighten the audience about their work with charities.

The first performance was opened by Ghanaian drumming by Alfons Hanson's family which included short tune to a tribal dance demonstrated by Edith Awadzi to the delight of the audience





The Anuket Belly dancers performed their body movements to melodious music.

A duet by Shirley Francis on saxophone and Julie Maquire on piano delighted the audience with a Morecombe and Wise sketch of *"playing all the right notes but not necessarily in the right order"* followed by two classic sing-along tunes – Moon River and Edelwiess (*from the sound of music*)





The Belly dancers returned to the stage and performed with another display of vibrant and exotic movements to excite the audience.



The final performance was the Ghanaian highlife music and dancing. This was the highlight of the evening performance. The first two highlife tunes were intended for all Ghanaians to dance, to be followed by an invitation to the audience to join in, but the melodic and rthythmic appeal of the music was so irresistible that the audience could not wait sitting and tapping their feet so they quickly joined the dancing and waving of white handkerchiefs *(that is Ghanaian highlife music for you!!)* The music went on until food was ready to be served.

This event was the "talk of the Church". Lots of comments and compliments as to how people enjoyed themselves and how great the evening was, were echoed.

The good news is, money raised was £1011.70p (net) for the two charities.

"Voices In Accord"

"Voices in Accord" is a group of 18 people who sing mixed harmony pieces, including songs from the shows and music ranging through from the 1920s to 1980s. The group was originally named "The Miscellany" Singers" under the direction of their then-conductor, Gwynne Evans, who arranged most of the music which the group sang. Upon Gwynne's retirement in 1995 the group renamed itself "Voices in Accord" under the leadership of Carol Williams, and the baton of Sue Forrest.

In the past the Group, as both "Miscellany Singers" and "Voices in Accord" has represented the Borough at various Town Twinning events, both in Emden and Schleswig. After rehearsing for many years at St John's Church Hillingdon, with which it has close ties, the group now rehearse at North Hillingdon Methodist Church. Fund raising has included several thousand pounds for "Save the Children", and various smaller amounts for other national charities.

Fairtrade Matters

Would you like a cuppa? How many times have you heard or said this common phrase?



Britain is known as a tea drinking nation but how familiar are tea drinkers with where the tea comes from and how it is grown? Who picks your tea and in what conditions? If any of you saw the recent Greg Wallace programme on tea, you may be better informed and aware tea is usually a blend of tea from many estates and possibly countries.

Over the past year Traidcraft Exchange has been asking the big tea companies to declare where they get their from. While initially reluctant to provide this detail, the outcome is that you can now visit the websites of companies such as PG Tips,



Tetley, Clipper or Typhoo and read about their tea suppliers and the Estates they buy from. In all, as a result of the ' commitment, it will now be possible to know where nearly 70% of Britain's tea supply comes from.

Having said it was not possible to publish the estates they buy from, tea companies have moved from a default of secrecy to a default of openness about where they source their tea from. You can also find the info about suppliers from Traidcraft Exchange's own website.

Why does this matter?

Knowing which estates are providing the tea, enables discussions to start between tea workers and estate managers about working conditions. The results will not be immediate but it establishes a chain of supply. In addition to workers being able to raise concerns, tea drinkers can make their concerns known in anticipation that tea companies will want to display care for all involved in the making of a cuppa.

So what are you being asked to do?

-express any concerns you have about tea pickers and their working conditions to companies

-make sure that companies maintain their commitment

-keep buying tea, particularly tea grown in Assam.

-remember that behind every cuppa there is an industry that provides livelihoods for over a million people.

-encourage companies to apply conditions that would permit the product passing the provisions to be considered Fairtrade.

The idea is that while you enjoy your cuppa you can be assured that those involved in providing it are also able to enjoy their role and receive an appropriate income.

About FAIRTRADE

 \cdot 'Fair trade' as a term means 'moving towards fairer trading conditions',

 \cdot 'Fairtrade' is the label used to identify products with the Fairtrade Mark. Fairtrade is a registered trademark.



 \cdot The Fairtrade Mark symbol is made up of a blue sky that symbolises optimism, and an arm, raised in the air – this symbolises empowerment. The Fairtrade Mark also incorporates the colour green to symbolise growth.

 \cdot Fairtrade products come from over 70 different countries from around the world.

The people who produce these items receive a minimum price and premium for their products.

 Fairtrade has encouraged many farmers to farm in a more sustainable and environmentally-friendly way, using fewer chemicals and effective irrigation. Exchange, Charity No. 1048752

low to Look After Your Church Land in Wildlife–Friendly Ways

How Green / Eco Friendly is your community? With the recent media headlines about the crisis the world is facing, and the Christian call to be good stewards, many might say there is a responsibility on Churches to do their bit.

But what does doing their bit involve?

The Eco church survey provides a guide on what churches are called on to consider and do. It can be about having discussions about what waste a church creates through its choice of cups, plates and purchases. It can also involve holding services that draw attention to Christians' responsibility to the natural world, how to make a building more energy efficient or how to make the grounds more beneficial to nature by what is grown or how it is maintained.

Have you checked out whether other churches in your area have signed up for Eco Church? Aylesbury and Haddenham already have Eco churches that should be able to show what is involved.

There are also some Eco Churches in Luton and Milton Keynes which might be more local for some Circuit Churches. At present North Bucks appears to have no Eco Churches. Now is that not an opportunity?

Prayer Group at the Grange School

From the start of the school year in October, I have met weekly with a group of students on a Wednesday afternoon at the Grange School. In our very first meeting the students who were mostly Christians, were asked what they wanted to happen in the sessions; they responded by saying that they wanted to take part in discussions and individual prayer. Throughout the year the sessions took on this format, starting with the introduction of a topic often with the use of a video clip, followed by a discussion and ending with prayer.

The group started with 4 students and soon grew to a healthy number of 15 each week. On more than one occasion we have had 20 – 25 students attend the sessions! The discussions are lively, challenging and often animated as the students have different views about faith and their belief in God. We have discussed the purpose of life; the various ways God speaks to us; shared personal testimonies and spoken frequently about faith in God and how faith has affected our lives. These discussions have provided an opportunity to encourage non-believing students to think about God, and they have challenged Christians to speak about their faith. Over the months, seeds have been sown, faith has been challenged and God has evidently worked on the minds and hearts of those involved. One incident has left a lasting impression on me.

In one of our sessions a student asked how he could gain the faith that we have, or how we could prove that God exists. I replied that we wouldn't be able to prove God's existence but if he was willing to open His heart, he could ask God to make Himself known to him. At the end of the session he asked if he could pray and he then went on to pray a heartfelt prayer, asking God to touch his heart and show him that He is real. This was the most touching moment of the entire year for me, as this non-believing student was praying for the faith to believe in God. This was not the only time he prayed in the year.

Three of the Christian students took over the planning and facilitating of the session, whilst I played the role of mentor and support. Throughout the year they grew in confidence, becoming bolder in sharing faith and overcoming the fear of praying in a group. Being a part of their growth has been a privilege and an experience I hope to repeat time and time again.

As exams are approaching many of the students have now left for study leave. The seeds have been sown and now their growth is in the hands of the Holy Spirit. I will continue to pray that their hearts will be open to God, and that the students who were questioning faith will one day experience God's love and grace in a personal way.

Please pray for the Grange School as God is clearly at work there. My prayer is that a Christian presence will be in the school for years to come, and that many young people will be encouraged to think about God and come to faith.

The ideal situation would be for each church to have a member or a group, that is responsible for the information posted about their local church
