#### PASTORAL LETTER

Some things are very different. Take rain for example, we are getting used to feeling a couple of drops and then nothing, or gentle showers that last a couple of minutes. True, there have been the occasional bursts of more energetic precipitation which are far more reflective of

what we have been used to over the past twenty-one years living in the Pennines. The thought of rain not always bringing on the drowned rat look has an appeal.

Then there is the geography – Skipton was steep hill obsessed. Any journey out of the town centre and there was the risk of some lung-busting gradient to keep you on your toes. The surrounding countryside was populated by sheep with the occasional herd of cows. Our old circuit had no dual carriageways, traffic lights were rare, roundabouts occasional. Now we are getting used to gentle rises, flat passages with hills an attractive backdrop to the huge fields full of produce. There is great beauty hereabouts which contrasts with the glorious vistas we have been privileged to enjoy in Yorkshire.

Change is an interesting process; it is part of life whether we like it or not. Some will fight it; others embrace the possibility. I had an aunt who spent her entire life from birth to death living in the same house. She resisted all my uncle's attempts to persuade her to move or re-model the house, and that reluctance to risk has always puzzled me. Their holidays were usually spent in Pitlochry with only the hotel changing when one closed down and they were then able to move somewhere different. She even dressed like she was still living in the 1950s, commenting to my mother about how difficult it was to find an afternoon dress any more. For whatever reason, change was not to be considered, even though she delighted in the more modern houses my parents inhabited and could see the benefits of more space etc. She was a conundrum – like she wanted the world to pass her by and leave her in a time warp of familiarity.

In the church we can struggle to set ourselves free from the time warp of familiarity as we strive to cling to how things used to be rather than embracing the new. It can be seen in our architecture, music, language and expectations.

It is almost like we are inclined to fight the way we are called to be. The way of faith is the way of change. Not change for change's sake, not inhabiting the world of fads and passing fancies, but seeking to be ready to follow the prompting of the spirit as we seek to be the church of today, intent on seeking the vision of the spirit as we seek to move in the direction to which God calls. One of my favourite hymns begins with the lines:

O breath of life come sweeping through us, Revive your church with life and power; O breath of life, come, cleanse renew us, And fit your Church to meet this hour.

It is a fantastic prayer, as indeed is the whole hymn (391 in Singing the Faith or 777 in Hymns and Psalms) as it offers a powerful reminder that we are to be a community on the move as we seek and respond to the prompting of the Spirit, as we strive to be the followers of Jesus.

Let us hope and pray that we will all be richly blessed on our journey.

#### A huge welcome to Waddesdon Methodist Chapel



The Chapel was built in 1877, alongside the old School Room, which is one of the oldest buildings still in use in the Circuit. Originally the chapel, it was replaced by the current chapel, it is now used as a meeting place and function room. The School Room was built in 1826 and is a listed building of interest; it has a long history of serving the community.

At Waddesdon we have a small congregation but a very happy and friendly one, we like to make sure all new and returning members are greeted with a handshake and a broad smile. Our services are every Sunday at 11am with most fourth Sundays being a Local Arrangement; these we take in





turn to lead.

We are lucky that the Chapel is lovely, warm and bright.

The front doors have recently been changed from solid oak (that were deteriorating fast) to lovely oak and glass doors which let the sunlight come right into the building.



Also the front entrance has been improved to make it wheelchair friendly with a purpose built ramp to a level floor into the chapel.

For the improvements to the Chapel and the refurbishment of the School Room, we have to thank our team of

fundraisers led by Barbara Warne who are constantly thinking of new ways to raise funds and to enable these improvements.



On the first Monday of each month the **Monday Friendship Club**, especially for the Over 50s meets from 2.30 — 4.30 pm. This is very much a social get together and anyone is welcome. Come along for a chat, a cup of tea and cake or a game of scrabble or simply to be with friends. This year we all decorated

a small teapot and had a display at the Horticultural show. This went down very well and created quite a lot of interest. See what we can do next year!

Every other Tuesday we serve light lunches in the hall and have a very contented regular following.



September brings the Harvest Festival and Supper, this is always a joyous time, with the



Chapel decorated with the goods from the

fields.

We look forward this October to two Christenings and a further one in November. Earlier this year we had a Wedding in the Chapel this was a

joyous occasion with only the weather threatening to spoil it but it did stop raining at just the right times.

Then it will soon be Christmas again when we hold our Christmas tree festival.

The Hall is also used regularly by the Brownies, a Dance School and a Choir. We look forward in September to welcoming the Ladies Club back.


