Dear Friends,

Parables

It's a relationship, not a religion!

A new survey has found that Christians experience higher levels of happiness, life satisfaction and self-worth than people who do not have a faith.

As part of the "Measuring National Well-being" research, the Office for National Statistics (ONS) questioned 300,000 people between 2012 and last year. In a table measuring happiness, Christians apparently scored themselves higher than every religious category except Hindus. According to the ONS, Christians are happier than those with no religion, plus Buddhists, Jews, Muslims and Sikhs. Similarly, Christians came in joint first place with Hindus in the life satisfaction index and ranked second in terms of self-worth, behind followers of Judaism.

Speaking on Premier Christian Radio's News Hour, Christian psychologist and retired psychology teacher, Nadia Foster, said "*People think all religions are the same but they're not. Those of us who are Christian say it's a relationship and not a religion. That makes a difference because you're having a relationship with a living God.*"

A UKIP peer has questioned whether new plans to combat extremism could result in those who read the Bible in public being found guilty of a hate crime.

Speaking in the House of Lords, Lord Pearson of Rannoch asked the government to respond to the potential risk of the changes which come into effect in April.

He'd suggested some might be offended if they claim that Jesus is God and denies the "divinity of Allah."

Home Office Minister Lord Ahmed replied stating that reading the Bible in public would never become a criminal offence. He said; "Reading texts from the Holy Bible in public or preaching the divinity of Christ is not a crime and never will be in this country. "The government's counter extremism strategy makes it clear that the government will protect free speech and the right to profess, practice and propagate any religion or indeed none."

Methodists in demand!

Whilst investigating the word 'tenterhooks' an interesting fact emerged. Tenterhooks aren't directly connected with tents or hooks. A tenter is a wooden frame used to hang woollen or linen cloth to prevent it from shrinking as it dries. The tenterhooks are, not surprisingly, the hooks on the tenter used to hold the cloth in place.

In the village of Helmshore, Lancashire, during the late 19th and early 20th century, there were a number of woollen mills that used the 'fulling process'. Before Fuller's Earth, human urine was used as a fulling agent as it had a similar effect.

Villagers were issued with earthenware pots which were kept outside their front doors which they filled from their chamber pots. They were emptied by the mills and households earned 1d (one penny) per pot.

Some mills only took the pots from Methodist (non-drinking) homes as it gave them a stronger product!

Unfortunately, because of the current lack of volunteers, the scheme is in danger of having to cease operation! We desperately need **Telephone Co-ordinators** (who arrange the trips) and **Drivers** with their own vehicles (who undertake to take people to their appointments and return them to their home afterwards). Telephone call costs can be reclaimed and drivers get 45p per mile (maximum rate allowed). No-one is tied to particular times and each trip is arranged individually.


