From the Manse

Dear Friends,

The season of Easter has made way for the season of Pentecost which we celebrate on the 15th May this year. This is a celebration of the gift of the Holy Spirit and with it the many gifts we have as human beings and we all have gifts and talents both learned and given (natural) and we are called to use them.

I read a story the other day - while on holiday in New York, a French tourist, Karine Valnais Gomeau was deeply moved by the number of homeless people she saw. When she noticed a dishevelled-looking man searching through the bins near Grand Central Station, she quickly offered him a bag of leftover pizza she was carrying. When the surprised man asked what was in the bag, she replied, "Je suis désolée [I am sorry, but the pizza is cold]." The man thanked her, and she went on her way. It was two days later that she discovered she had given pizza to the famous actor Richard Gere, who was filming on location in New York City.

Matthew 25:35 says this

For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.' "Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?' "The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.'

We may never get the chance to give pizza to a famous actor. But we can serve Jesus using the gifts we have. We can reach out to the hungry, the thirsty, the lonely, the naked, the prisoner. We can help "the least of these" and really be doing it for Jesus and one day Jesus will say:

Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world (Matthew 25:34).

What is Pentecost ?

Whitsunside -

Whit Sunday, 15th March

The birthday of the Church!

Pentecost is the festival when Christians celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit. It is celebrated on the Sunday fifty days after Easter. Traditionally the Church celebrated it as Whitsun - 'White Sunday'.

The Holy Spirit is the third part of the Trinity of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, the way Christians understand God.

Pentecost is a happy festival. Ministers in church often wear robes with red in the design as a symbol of the flames in which the Holy Spirit came to earth.

Saxon word 'wit', which we still use for verbal cleverness but which meant 'understanding' - Pentecost was when God poured out the wisdom of the Spirit.

Luke tells the story of speaking in tongues in Acts 2:1-13.

A relationship, not a religion!

A new survey has found that Christians experience higher levels of happiness, life satisfaction and self-worth than people who do not have a faith.

As part of the "Measuring National Well-being" research, the Office for National Statistics (ONS) questioned 300,000 people between 2012 and last year. In a table measuring happiness, Christians apparently scored themselves more highly than every religious category except Hindus. According to the ONS, Christians are happier than those with no religion, plus Buddhists, Jews, Muslims and Sikhs. Similarly, Christians came in joint first place with Hindus in the life satisfaction index and were ranked second in terms of self-worth, behind followers of Judaism.

Speaking on Premier Christian Radio's News Hour, Christian psychologist and retired psychology teacher, Nadia Foster, said: "*People think all religions are the same but they're not. Those of us who are Christian say it's a relationship and not a religion.* That makes a difference because you're having a relationship with a living God."

Risborough Good Neighbours

This is a voluntary scheme run to help people without transport get to all kinds of medical appointments. It is a lifeline to many people in Risborough and the local villages.

In the past year they completed at least 700 trips. Unfortunately, due to a lack of volunteers they have been unable to fulfil all the requests made. Sometimes they have been unable to find a driver or there have not been enough co-ordinators to fill all the days, from Monday to Friday. Those who have not been able to get a reply on 01844 342600 are asked to try again later. If more volunteers don't come forward this scheme will be in **great danger of failing completely.**

Co-ordinators arrange to find drivers after receiving telephone calls from clients. Drivers take clients to appointments and bring them home. Co-ordinators can charge for telephone calls and drivers receive the maximum rate of 45p. per mile for journeys charged from their home. No one is tied to any particular

time, each trip is arranged individually.
